Thinking with Our Hearts



During a Monday morning Brawerman Elementary School West *t'filah*, a bright-eyed little girl's hand shot up in the middle of a story, and she said: "But Rabbi we know this story already, didn't we read it last year?" She was right. We did. What I explained to this inquisitive first grader was that while

the story in our Torah scroll was the same this year, she was no longer the same. It is the reader, the listener, the individual that changes every year, not the story. Actors who work in the Stanislavsky method envision and create a detailed subtext for each of their lines, filling in the minutia of their lives. It is what

they bring to the lines, the subtext, that creates meaningful, deep characters and interesting stories. Our understanding of Torah evolves the same way. The words are the same each year—we are not.

This year the newest members of our family, eighteen eager kindergarteners attending Brawerman Elementary School East, will read from the Torah scroll. As they grow, so will the meaning of Torah in their lives. Each year we will challenge them to think with their hearts about the stories of our ancestors, which are now their stories too.

This Simchat Torah, as we end the annual reading of Torah and immediately begin it again, ask yourself in what ways are you different this year? Then discover the Torah anew.

We End Only to Begin Again

Simchat Torah (Deuteronomy: 43 & Genesis 1)

Our neatly organized schedule of Torah portions is all but thrown out the window this month as we celebrate the High Holy Days including Sukkot and Simchat Torah. We interrupt the normal progression of our Torah readings to read special portions linked to each fall holiday. As a result, we find ourselves skipping around the Torah a bit. However, just when it feels like we may have lost our way, Simchat Torah gets us back on track.

While we begin our New Year on Rosh HaShanah, we don't begin our new year of reading the Torah until Simchat Torah. On Simchat Torah we read the final sections of Deuteronomy, as our ancestors transition from a life with Moses as their leader, to one without him. No sooner have we finished the Torah, we immediately pick up with the very beginning of Genesis and the story of creation—marking our own transition in our annual cycle of Torah reading.

Simchat Torah reminds us that Jewish time, unlike the time of our daily lives, is not linear—it's circular. We have a cyclical calendar of festivals, holidays, and Torah readings. We end only to begin again.

Magic happens when we combine our linear lives with circular Torah. As we progress through our lives, we return year after year to the same moments on the Jewish timeline. We return to these same High Holy Days every year, to the same Torah portions—but we are different. We have faced new challenges and new experiences. As we transition into a new year of Torah, may it be a year in which we encounter the familiar teachings of our Torah in new and exciting ways. *L'shanah tovah.*

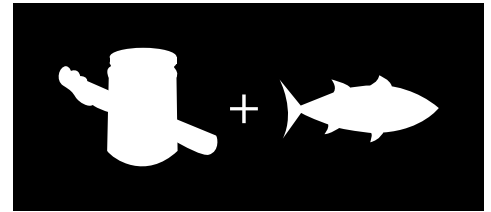
What Do Peanut Butter & Tuna Have in Common?

It's probably not a combination many of us would like to have on our sandwich, but peanut butter and tuna are the primary proteins that we distribute at our Temple Campus Food Pantry.

Every Sunday—for the past twenty-three years—dedicated members of our congregation feed the hungry in the Wilshire Center neighborhood at our Food Pantry. Over the past year, we have seen the line grow longer by the week. We're currently distributing approximately two hundred grocery bags each Sunday, a fifty percent increase over the last eighteen months. Sadly, this is not the only indicator of our challenging economic times.

The L.A. County Food Bank, which supplies much of the food we distribute, has seen a dramatic drop in inventory. As a result, it has become increasingly difficult for us to get food from them, especially proteins like tuna and peanut butter, both of which are essential in providing a balanced, protein rich diet to our clients.

As we come together to celebrate the High Holy Days, we ask that you help us feed the most needy in our city by donating cases of tuna and peanut butter—it's never been easier.



Making a difference has never been easier. Simply visit our website, or call the Temple, and select how much tuna and/or peanut butter you would like to donate—we'll take care of the rest. You will know that you made this New Year truly a *shannah tovah*—a sweet New Year for those in need.

The Impact of Technology

“If we teach today as we taught yesterday,” John Dewey wrote, “We rob our children of tomorrow.” Mindful of these words, Brawerman’s first grade teachers are piloting an innovative iPad program. Children work on math skills, number concepts, or problem solving without paper, pencils or traditional workbooks. Our “digital natives” (a term coined to describe the first generation to grow up with new technology) are engaged and involved in learning and using their iPads.

“I love math and I love iPads. I love learning them together!” says first grader, Max Weene.

Working in close collaboration with classroom teachers and specialists, Adrienne Coffield, Brawerman Director of Academic Technology, has a remarkable year planned.

Primary students will be creating a large graphic installation depicting the school theme, *Yad b’Yad* (Hand in Hand). Sixth graders will design calligraphy fonts to incorporate along with *claymation* into their Shakespearean virtual museums.

Students love the flight simulator which uses the x-plane application—along with yoke, throttle, and rudder pedals, for a real-life flight experience. This program integrates components of grade level curricula, from the study of weather to building math and comprehension skills.

Research shows that students’ motivation increases through seamlessly incorporating technology into daily activities and lessons. They take an active role in their learning, building communication skills and making choices such as how to generate, obtain, manipulate or display information.

As our “natives” grow up in this digital world, changes in the way we teach and the way we learn will continue to impact their lives far beyond the elementary school classroom.

This year, the Hebrew program started with a bang during our second Hebrew Pod Extravaganza. We had music, balloons, and lots of Hebrew games. Through many different activities our students had the chance to practice and refresh their Hebrew language skills. Everyone had fun, and the Extravaganza is promising to become an annual tradition.

We are looking forward to a year full of Hebrew and Judaic learning. We are also in the process of preparing for our grades three and seven Sukkot sleepover on October 15 and our Retreat HaGadol experience for grades three through twelve, November 4-6. These events are open to students from Brawerman Elementary School and our Religious School.

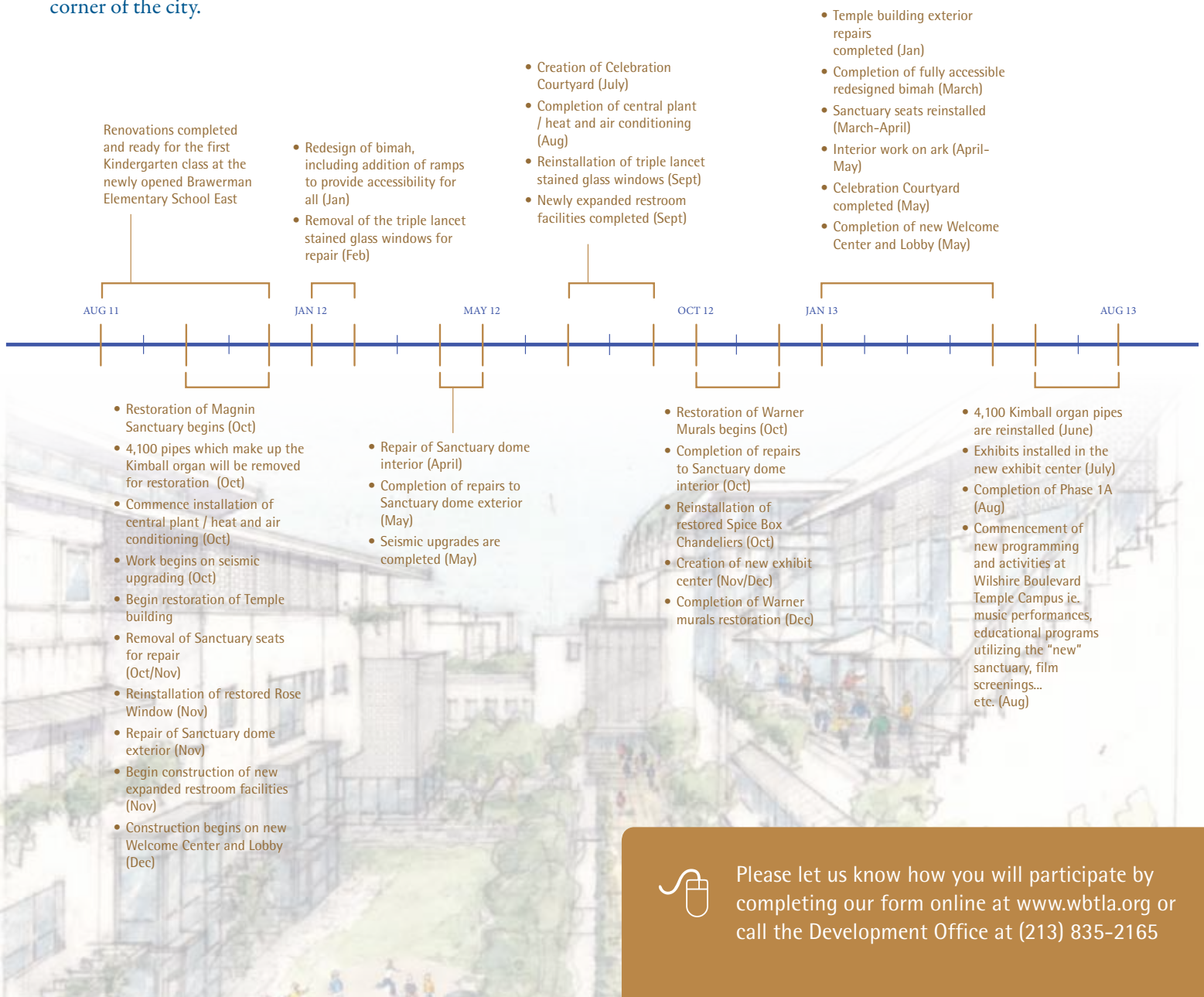


Celebrating a Legacy, Building a Future
