With the wisdom of age, we recognize that true love actually means *always* saying “I’m sorry,” and really meaning it. How often do we hurt family members, without taking steps to make amends?

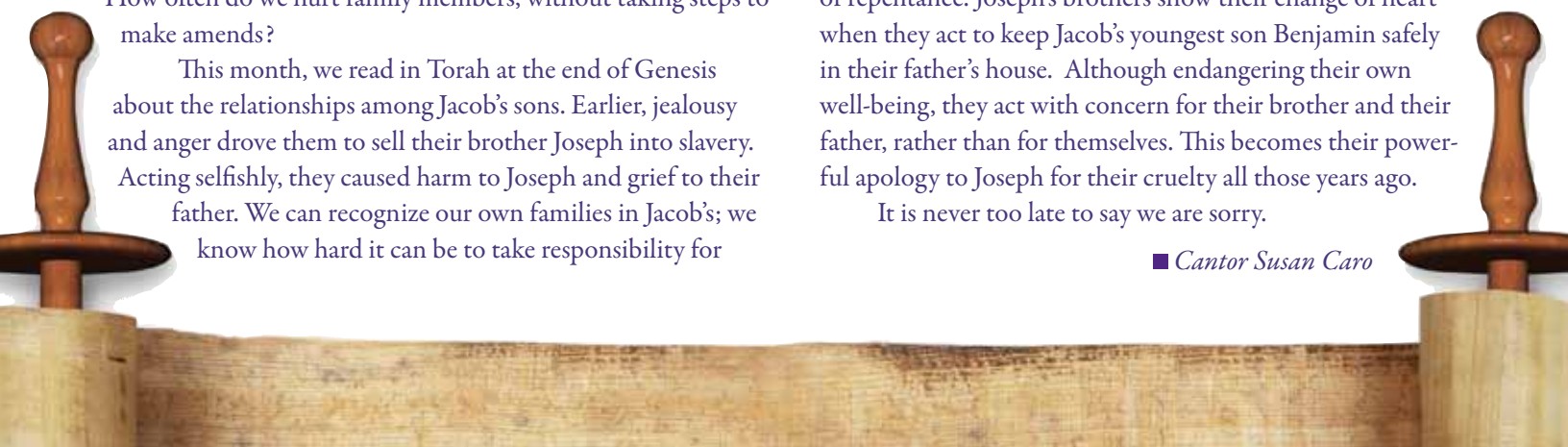
This month, we read in Torah at the end of Genesis about the relationships among Jacob’s sons. Earlier, jealousy and anger drove them to sell their brother Joseph into slavery. Acting selfishly, they caused harm to Joseph and grief to their father. We can recognize our own families in Jacob’s; we know how hard it can be to take responsibility for

our actions toward our loved ones. Our families can be our greatest source of pain and of love—moments of both blame and belonging, of guilt and generosity, of weeping and joy, and ultimately of healing and transformation.

Judaism teaches that changed behavior is the true mark of repentance. Joseph’s brothers show their change of heart when they act to keep Jacob’s youngest son Benjamin safely in their father’s house. Although endangering their own well-being, they act with concern for their brother and their father, rather than for themselves. This becomes their powerful apology to Joseph for their cruelty all those years ago.

It is never too late to say we are sorry.

What is the legacy we seek to impart to our children? Jewish tradition tells us to “teach our children diligently” from generation to generation, to step beyond our self-imposed boundaries and into the Light of Torah. Our religious school curriculum is firmly based upon this Jewish tradition. In each grade level from Tamar/Kindergarten to Beit Midrash and Wednesday Night Programs for grades 8-12, our students learn balance for leading a Jewish life that creates a deepening of their relationships and perspective. They learn their place within our community and also assume responsibilities that reach beyond, to change our world.

The mitzvot of *chesed*/mercy, *ometz lev*/courage, *anavah*/humility, *rachamim*/compassion enjoin us to “become” the values we want to exhibit. They require modeling and practice in order to make them a reality or they are only empty words without the required, resulting positive actions that have the



power to transform lives. It is our responsibility to take an active part in our children’s education by ensuring that they see us, their teachers, but especially their parents, as role models.

Through thoughtful, impactful action and study, our students learn about the values that are reflected in Biblical and historical heroes. But they also learn that heroes are real people. Our desire is to instill within them a sense of Jewish awareness that will enable each of them to become a mensch and a transmitter of mitzvot to the next generation. Chanukah is for Activists

The Greeks were benevolent rulers, bringing progress wherever they conquered. Sometimes they were tolerant, however, in the year 167 BCE King Antiochus Epiphanes forced all the people under his rule to adopt Greek culture, and for Jews that meant abandoning Jewish culture and practice.

The Greco-Syrians took over the sacred Temple in Jerusalem, and Mattathias and his five sons launched a guerilla war of resistance. Mattathias passed on the leadership to his son, Judah, who, because of his political savvy and bravery, defeated the Greeks, liberated Jerusalem and reclaimed the Temple. The Talmud tells us that a flask of oil was found in the Temple, enough to burn for only one day; miraculously it lasted for eight.

Chanukah emphasizes the right to be different; the right not to assimilate into the majority culture. Today we may not have the occasion to overthrow tyrants or purify temples, but we have the right and responsibility to act upon and advocate for our beliefs. Whether in politics, business or family, we work to resolve injustice, to right the wrong, to correct the unethical. This message of activism is integral to Chanukah even if and especially if it means standing strong against the tide.

BUILDING LIVES POISED FOR SUCCESS: FIRST FINANCIAL GOAL WITHIN SIGHT!

Three years into an unprecedented effort to raise funds to restore, renew and redevelop our historic Temple Campus, we are poised to begin work after High Holy Days 2011. With your help, we can reach this “trigger point” that will allow us to begin the first and most important phase of the project.

With \$54.5 million in formal signed pledges and \$13.25 million in bequests we are almost halfway toward the \$150 million in total estimated costs to restore the sanctuary and historic buildings, renovate the two-story historic school building on Harvard, build a new four-story school building and construct a six-story 500-space parking structure with rooftop play yard. Because we cannot use bequests to fund initial construction, we need to raise another \$26 million to pay for the beginning work.

Initial costs are approximately \$80 million and comprise the complete restoration of the sanctuary, seismic upgrades; core and shell upgrades to Piness Auditorium and Stalford Hall; creation of a new entrance and courtyard to the sanctuary on the east side and installation of a temporary central plant for air conditioning. It also will pay for almost two acres of land acquired over the last two years that expand the scope of the project to the entire city block. By any standard, the Building Lives

project is complex, comprising historic preservation and urban redevelopment on four acres; in the congregational world, it is unique.

The Board

of Trustees has a longstanding practice to proceed with renovation and construction only after 80% of the costs are committed in signed pledge agreements. With an \$80 million goal for the first phase of work, we must have \$64 million in secure commitments by May 31 for groundbreaking to proceed in September after the High Holy Days.

Our Glazer Early Childhood Center at the Temple is already a great success and well on its way to becoming the most popular nursery school in the heart of the city. We are beginning Brawerman Elementary School East in the fall of 2011 and already have applications in hand. We are restoring the most glorious legacy of our city’s Jewish past and building the most vibrant vision for its future.

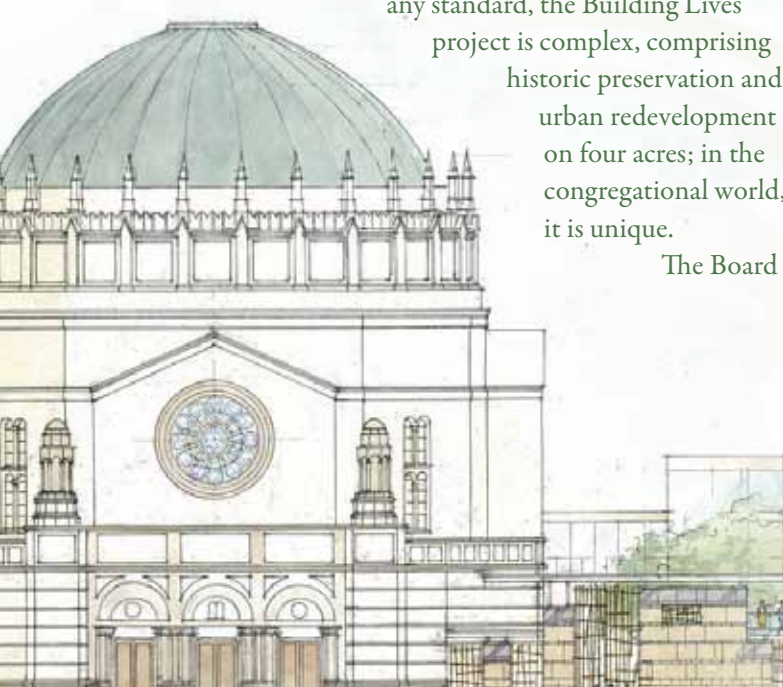

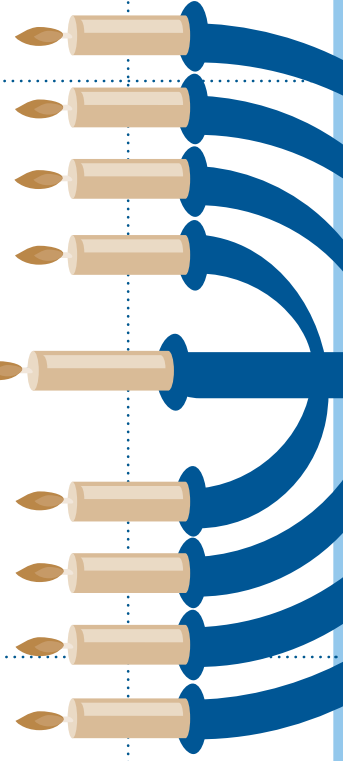
